WELCOME TO THE COURSE!

While some take for granted that inclusion is a common value, recent events, media headlines and social media feeds clearly indicate that resistance to diversity and alive and well. Looking around us — in our online classes, in our regular classes and in our workplaces — it is apparent that we live, learn and work in diverse environments. This diversity brings with it great opportunities as well as significant challenges. During this course will develop basic understanding of the impact of diversity on workplace experiences, employment equity and inclusion. We will learn about the basic theoretical perspectives that inform our understanding of these concepts, and examine diversity and inclusion of specific identity groups.

Our online discussions and activities rely on your advance preparation of the assigned readings. Your active participation in online discussion is expected. The course will also include groupwork. 
