AP/EN 4181 6.0A (SU) Contemporary Literature: Writers and Drugs

**Description:** All human cultures have involved relationships with psychoactive plant

substances (henceforth referred to as "drugs") which include, as the title of one book on the subject suggests, everything "From Chocolate to Morphine." In this course, we will explore the connection between drugs and writing in a variety of cultural products. We will examine the notion of post-WWII "drug subcultures", and we will attempt to define a specific set of cultural and literary structures for a variety of substances, from alcohol to LSD. We will consider the problems of describing "drug experiences" in different types of media and genre (literature, scientific research, religious and anthropological accounts as well as popular cultural presentations such as TV series like The Wire and Weeds) and the close

association of drugs with music.
