COURSE OBJECTIVES:

This course is designed to provide an understanding on what it means to be an effective manager and leader. We will examine personality traits of leaders, nature and styles of leadership, and key leadership skills required to create a vision, to establish constructive organizational climate, and to overcome obstacles. Grounded in theory, emphasis is on developing self-awareness, and understanding personal and interpersonal competencies in the context of organizational complexities in practicing effective leadership.

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- > gain an awareness of their own leadership philosophy, traits, skills, and behaviors;
- > develop an understanding and appreciation for the unique dimensions of their personal style, their strengths and weakness, and ways to improve what they do as managers and leaders;
- > expand their understanding of the fundamental ways leadership is practiced in the North American context.

PREREQUISITES: AP/HRM 2600 3.0

Students are personally responsible to ensure that they have the required prerequisites as stated in the course outline or in the course calendar. COURSE EVALUATION:

Class Participation: 10% Group Assignment: 25% Mid-term Exam: 30% Final Exam: 35%

Class Participation: 10%

Due to the nature of this course, class participation is essential. Students will be expected to do the assigned readings on time and come prepared for class discussions. In-class discussions will be deeper and more insightful if students have all come to class to discuss the material. In-class exercises will expose students to real work samples and help students develop skills and abilities related to the effective manager and leader. Students will be awarded points each class if engaging in quality discussions and in group-based exercises.

Group Assignment: 25%

The class will be formed into groups of 5-6 students in the third class. Each group will select a well-known leader to study his/her leadership traits, styles, contingencies, and effectiveness.

The group assignment has two components: a written report (15%) and presentation (10%).

The written report must be submitted to the Professor before the group presentation. The format of the report is 10-11 pages (excluding any appendices or references), double spaced, 1" margins on all sides, and 12-point Times New Roman font. The report must include a list of articles cited, using the APA style, and also include each group member's full names and student numbers. The report will be evaluated on style (grammar, etc.) and content (the extent and quality of research, analysis, and recommendations).

Each group will present its analysis report at the end of semester. Details will be provided in class.

Mid-Term Exam: 30%

A mid-term exam will be held at 19:00-21:00, October 21. It is imperative that students attend the mid-term since *there will be no other alternative dates to write a make-up exam*. The mid-term exam is a closed-book exam covering **text chapters 1-6.** The format will be multiple-choice and short-essay questions. More details will be provided closer to the exam date.

Final Exam: 35%

The final exam will be held during the formal examination period for the semester. It is imperative that students attend the final exam since *there will be no other alternative date to write the final exam*. The final exam is closed-book and cumulative, covering **text chapters 1-13**. The format will be short-essay questions, and a case study. More details will be provided closer to the exam date.
