Course Description:

This course studies the interdependence that arises from international trade in goods and services. The course will cover the most fundamental trade models, and will often refer to current issues of international trade politics and globalization. Among the treated questions are: Why do countries trade? Does international trade deepen wage inequality? Is growth in emerging economies bad for Western countries? How does trade affect competition? What are the consequences of protectionism? Although the course will emphasize the understanding of past and current events in the world economy, we will heavily rely on formal economic modelling to help us understand these events. Additional topics include studying the institutions dealing with, and regulating trade policy.
