<u>Course Description</u>: The course introduces students to gender gaps and discrimination, especially in connection with labour markets, policy towards gender equality, and other features of family economics, such as marital transfers and issues of power within the family. The course examines evidence from developed (especially the US) and developing countries and uses concepts from that draw from psychology and anthropology.

Course Objectives:

(1) Brief statement of the purpose:

The purpose of this course is to assist students in developing the tools to analyze gender inequality using economic theories and empirical evidence. We will use some basic statistical tools in order to examine the sources of gender gaps.

(2) Brief list of specific learning outcomes of the course:

The specific outcomes of the course are that students will be able to:

- Use basic statistical concepts to examine empirical evidence
- Use microeconomic theory to understand optimal choice in a gender context, such as intrahousehold allocation
- Understand the difference between correlation and causation in the context of gender economics
- Understand the facts around gender inequality, patterns and determinants
- Write a creative research paper regarding a specific gender difference of their choice

Paper:

Students will write a research paper for this course. For detailed information, please see the file "Paper Instructions".

Assignments:

There will be regular assignments in this course. The assignments are not to be submitted, and will be solved in class. I will give bonus marks at the end of the course for regular participation in class. I do expect attendance during the days we are solving assignments in class. IMPORTANT NOTE: I will NOT provide solutions to assignments. I expect students to come to class on the days we solve them and take notes.

Evaluation:

The final grade for the course will be based on the following items weighted as indicated:

Midterm: 25% Research paper: 35% Final exam: 40%

Midterm: October 24, during class time

Final exam: TBA, determined by the University

Missed exams/Tests:

There will be **no make up exams for either the midterm or the final exam**. For students missing the midterm, the weight of the midterm will be carried to their final exam; therefore, they will have a 100% final exam. There will be no deferred standing agreements.
