Description:	This course explores select works published in the first two decades of this century. With an eye to the variety of genres at play today, it takes up contemporary American novels, songs, short stories, essays, and the graphic novel. It features a diversity of voices, assembling work by American writers who are originally from Europe, Africa, the Caribbean, and Asia, along with American-born authors, including Latinx and LGBTQ writers. Students will encounter a range of sub-genres, including science fiction, horror, humour, memoir, along with contemporary modes of literary realism. In respect of the global economic, political, and cultural influence that the United States wielded especially after World War II, the 1900s have been characterized as "the American century." American literature of the 21 st century regularly ponders the breakdown of such myths of self-assuredness and its ramifications on all levels, from the
	national to the personal. This term, we will try to notice and understand how recent modes of social insecurity challenge America to revise and renew its myths of resilience.
