COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

Leadership not only determines the fate of organizations, but also affects the personal, social, and professional lives of employees. The importance and complexity of leadership have attracted researchers worldwide to conduct thousands of scientific studies over the years. This course provides an in-depth presentation and discussion of theories of leadership, and how they apply to real-life situations. Throughout the course, you will learn about leadership traits and behaviours, how leaders motivate and form relationships with followers, and how leaders inspire followers to pursue higher goals, to behave ethically and authentically, and to work effectively in teams. Lectures, cases, videos, and in-class activities will be used.

Please note that this is a course that depends on remote teaching and learning. There will be no in-person interactions or activities on campus. To participate in this remote course, you will require computer and internet access to download class materials, tune into weekly lectures, complete and submit exercises and projects, and complete examinations.
