AP/KOR 3600 Contemporary Korean Culture

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Course description:

This course introduces students to contemporary Korean culture, identity, and society and to help students develop a dynamic understanding of contemporary Korean culture by taking an interdisciplinary approach to cultural and socio-political issues of Korean society. Over the last five decades, Korea has undergone a rapid societal and cultural change. This new development and many other social changes will be explored in terms of Korean society, gender, family, and identity issues. This course combines online lectures and virtual discussions of readings.

Organization of the course:

Students will study the lecture videos prior to the Zoom meetings and will participate in virtual presentations as well as discussions. The Zoom meetings will occur bi-weekly for about 90 minutes on the dates assigned on the course schedule. All the course materials will be provided on Moodle.
