Course Description: This course is the second part of development economics that builds on the knowledge of development problems facing less developed countries, acquired in the first part, to understand how policies are formulated and how effective they are in putting less developed countries on the path of economic and human development. We will discuss the role of state in development policy and some factors that may act as stumbling blocks for the formulation of right policies and their implementation. In particular, we will study the role of institutions as deep structural determinants of development and development policies. Our focus will be on people-centered economic development so we will learn how economic development is related to inequality, human development, and human security.

Prerequisites: AP/ECON 1000 3.00 and AP/ECON 1010 3.00 or equivalents. Course credit exclusions: AK/ECON 3560 3.00, AP/ECON 3320 3.00, AK/PPAS 3560 3.00.
