Description:	This course will introduce students to a range of health-related
	issues in representative literary texts of various authors and

	sickness. The course focuses on the intersection of literature and
	health, both from the perspective of literature's ongoing interest
	in health issues, and from the perspective of understanding these
	issues by appreciating their expression (and learning how to
	analyze it) in literature. Although the focus of the course may
	vary from year to year in accordance with the selected texts, it is
	typically organized around a series of thematic units such as
	"domestic ailments," "plagues and nightmares," "physician-
	writers," and "cross-cultural medicine and healing." The course
	will be provided online through twice-weekly lectures on eclass,
	in conjunction with an online discussion forum.
