Description:	Canadian writers have gained international acclaim for their work in the short story, a phenomenon highlighted by Alice Munro's winning of the Nobel Prize for Literature for her work in the form. This course explores the Canadian short story through study of authors and texts representing a variety of backgrounds, regions, aesthetic philosophies, and genres. We will examine the texts in their personal, social, historical, and generic contexts, and seek to understand how various authors both have employed and challenged the conventions of the short story.
