Description:	This course introduces students to some important literary works from the						
	continent of Africa. Texts will be studied in the context of histories of						
	decolonialization of African nation states and how African writers respond to this						
	history.						
	The course starts with the oral African tradition and its influence on the scripted						
	texts. It proceeds to a survey of the literature, with a focus on texts that are written						
	in English and some translations. It demonstrates the regional particularities, such as the ways the indigenous cultures and aesthetics shape the writers' choices. The						
	other contexts that are examined include colonialism, anti-colonial struggles,						
	globalization, and contemporary migrations. Poetry, fiction, and drama are						
	analysed to reveal the consequences of the writers' choices of form and style.						
	The class format is a combination of lectures and discussion. The lectures introduce						
	and demonstrate the contextual, critical, formal, and interpretive frameworks that are applied to the texts. Students have an opportunity to test their ideas through						
	written and oral responses to the various texts.
