Description:	This course examines Poe's tales of horror, his detective fiction, his
	one novel, his lyric poetry, and his critical theories about the short
	story and poetry. Among the topics to be considered will be: horror &
	terror; reason, sanity, and madness; the grotesque and the macabre;
	drugs and the poetic imagination; the idea of beauty; the detective
	story and the criminal mind; the double; poetic intensity; the imp of
	the perverse; transgressive experience; the aesthetic of the poem,
	the short story and the novel form(s). We will consider Poe's works
	using a variety of critical approaches: for example, affective criticism,
	psychological and mythological approaches, as well as Marxisms,
	literary history, gender/feminisms, reader-response theory, rhetoric, and close textual analysis. The objectives of the course will be to
	enable students to engage with Poe's literary texts, and to acquire the
	skills to analyze and interpret these texts.
