Course Description:

In this course we apply the analytical tools from AP/ECON 2300 3.00 to analyse resource allocations in imperfectly competitive markets such as monopoly and oligopoly as well as factor pricing in alternative market structures. We also consider the basic concepts of general equilibrium and welfare economics and briefly discuss the possible market failures due to externalities and asymmetric information.
