#### **Course Description**

This course studies the central bank and its use of monetary policy to control growth and fluctuations in the Canadian economy through the chartered banking system. It considers links between Canada's financial system and the international financial system, with particular emphasis on the restraining influence of international financial requirements on the attainment of national goals.

#### **Evaluation**

#### **Missed Tests**

There will be no make-up for the midterm exam. Students absent from the mid-term exam for documented reasons will have the weight transferred to their final exam. The deferred exam for the final exam will be granted only for medical reasons. In such cases students should submit a deferred exam application together with the supporting documents (attending physician's statement) to the economics department to my attention. The date and time of the deferred exam will be set at a later date. Students who may require further extensions or accommodation will have to submit a formal petition to the Faculty.

#### <u>Grading</u>

The grading scheme for the course conforms to the 9-point grading system used in undergraduate programs at York (e.g., A + = 9, A = 8, B + = 7, C + = 5, etc.). Assignments and tests will bear either a letter grade designation or a corresponding number grade (e.g. A + = 90 to 100, A = 80 to 90, B + = 75 to 79, etc.)

#### Organization of the Course

The course involves formal lectures by the course director. The lectures will be supplemented by discussion questions and problems to be worked out by the students. Students who have difficulties answering the questions should consult with the teaching assistant(s) who will be available to assist students during their office hours. The required readings are central to the course. The lectures and tutorials, where applicable, will serve to enrich, clarify, and illustrate crucial issues from the assigned readings.
