### Course Description:

There will be no make-up for the term tests. If you are unable to take a term test **for a valid reason ONLY**, the weight of the test will be added to the final exam. The final exam will be held during the university exam period. Students have been caught using these services to cheat and gain unfair advantage over honest students. The cheating students and "tutors" have received academic dishonesty punishments ranging from failing courses, to being expelled, to losing their YorkU degrees. Officially supported resources to help students learn course material will be provided by YorkU officials, such as your professors and your department. These services are offered at no cost to you as a student. Your professor will likely provide weekly office help hours to meet with students and if you are a first- or second-year student and would like help with course material, make sure you join one of our weekly Peer Assisted Study Sessions (PASS).
