Description: What is the relationship between different texts? Why do some writers mix genres, borrow from other literature, or even rewrite existing literature to create new works? In this course we'll look at how literary texts are influenced by, intersect with, and reflect other texts. We'll also look at the origins of intertextuality as a literary technique. Students may already be familiar with contemporary uses of this technique in such things as mash-up songs, Quentin Tarantino movies, Family Guy, hip-hop, and novels like Pride and Prejudice, and Zombies. In this course we'll learn how the technique of mixing different texts, different forms, and different genres developed through the history of literature and how it has influenced the way that we use language today in everything from facebook to fan fiction. This course will also help students develops skills for studying literature. This course is designed for students who will major in English. Strong essay writing skills are required.
