Delivery Format:	SEMINAR
Description:	This course focuses on the wide range of drama written and performed in Canada since 1967. We begin with a study of the nationalist movement of the 1960s and 1970s and then turn our attention to the diversity of voices that emerged in the period from the mid-1980s to the present. We read plays by Indigenous, African Canadian, Asian Canadian, South Asian Canadian, and women writers, among others, that critique the racism, sexism, and colonialism of the nation-state. Selected readings address some of the pressing issues of our times, such as missing and murdered Indigenous women and anti-Black racism. We also discuss how recent theatrical narratives about family, memory, place, and identity introduce a diasporic consciousness to Canadian drama. The course analyzes the thematic, formal, and theatrical features of the selected texts, while also situating them in their respective cultural and political contexts. Some attention will be paid to recent film and television adaptations of Canadian plays.
