Course Description

The course will cover the Sasanians of Iran, their origins, rise, domination of the Middle East, and their subsequent defeat and fall at the hands of the Arab Muslims. The Sasanid Empire was the last of the great pre-Islamic Middle Eastern states. Equal attention will be paid to the political, economic, religious, and cultural developments. Periodic reference will be made to the elements that had a direct impact on Islamic civilization. Among the themes and topics covered: The topography of Iraq and Iran; the impact of Mesopotamian, Iranian and Hellenistic culture; the nature and development of Zoroastrianism; the fall of the Parthians and the establishment of the Sasanian state; administrative and legal reforms; economic production and trade; aspects of Sasanid jurisprudence; family and gender relations; art and architecture; the imperial capital at Ctesiphon; Zoroastrian heresies and the spread of Judaism, Christianity and Gnosticism; the struggle with Rome and Byzantium; the relationship with Central Asia; the threat from Arabia; the fall in Iraq; the continuing legacy of the Sasanians in Islamic civilization.

Requirements

- 1) Five 400-500 word essays. 30% (6% each)
- 2) Two end-of-term exams (Midterm & Final). 50% (25% each)
- 3) One short (12 pages) research paper. 20%

Essays

All essays should be typed, double-spaced, 12-point font, 1-inch margins on all sides and handed in via Turnitin. You must be prepared to discuss your essays and explain your arguments if called upon. Essay questions will be posted on the Moodle site and explained in class. Essays handed in after the due date will be deducted one grade and an additional grade thereafter for each following day. Exceptions can be made for illness or family emergency at the instructor's discretion.

Exams

Exams are 3 hours long and will consist of three parts: Identifications (about 120-150 words each, 35%), Short Answers (about 200-300 words each, 30%), and one Essay (about 700-900 words, 35%). Identifications will be limited to terms listed on the Moodle site. Samples of short answers and essay questions will be given in class during review session. Exams will be held during the university-mandated exam periods. Exact date will be set by the registrar's office and announced in class.
