<b>Description:</b>	<p>This course will provide the theoretical foundation for students in the digital writing concentration to become community-engaged professionals in the capstone Digital Authoring Practicum. This year’s course will do so through a focus on the intersections of rhetoric, technology, and ethics. In particular, we’ll think about sources, factors, consequences, and responses to issues such as AI technologies, plagiarism, deepfakes, social injustice, harassment, misinformation, conspiracy, and more.
