GER 1791 – The Fairy Tale: From Grimm to Disney

Course Description

Pervasive in most cultures across the globe, fairy tales are more than just children's literature. They encapsulate in (usually) succinct form many of the most pressing concerns of human existence: family conflict, the struggle for survival, sexual desire, the quest for happiness, among many others. Published about 200 years ago, Brothers Grimm's Fairy Tales remains one of the most iconic pieces of literature and has had significant influence on modern pop culture. This course examines fairy tales in the context of their longevity, their origins, and their ever-changing roles in popular culture and a range of media.

Course Format and Organization

Sections designated with the code "LECT" consist of a weekly in-person lecture plus a weekly 1-hour, in-person tutorial.

Sections designated with the code "BLEN" consist of online modules plus one weekly 1-hour, in-person tutorial. Online modules are delivered asynchronously, which means that although there are weekly deadlines, students can complete the work at times that are most convenient for them.
