GER 4752/EN4462 – German History and Memory in Comics from around the Globe

Course Description

This course analyzes representations of 20th-century German history in comics produced in Germany, Europe, and North America. Students examine various genres to determine how artists employ comics' special narrative possibilities to recount the past, investigate the workings of memory, make interventions into national and transnational memory discourses, and to commemorate or pay homage to popular comics characters and creators. All texts are available in English. German majors will have opportunities to complete some readings and assignments in German, at a level appropriate to their language proficiency.

Course Format and Organization

This course meets once weekly for a three-hour, in-person seminar. Class time will be used for short lectures, discussions, and collaborative group activities (e.g. visual analyses of comics, guided exploration of various comics theories and concepts from the field of memory studies).
