Course Description

Overview: This course is an introduction to development economics. We will talk about the meaning of economic development and examine development issues as they occur in developing as well as developed countries. The specific set of topics we delve into will be chosen in collaboration with students, to match their questions and interests.

Course Learning Objectives:

- To understand how <u>economists approach</u> the analysis of <u>development issues</u>.
- To read and summarize different arguments and perspectives on development, as an economist.
- To <u>collaborate</u> effectively with other students to <u>communicate</u>, <u>analyze</u> and <u>present ideas/</u> <u>arguments</u>.
- To <u>write cohesively</u> on development issues and policy through the lens of an economist.

- You may be grouped with other students for joint activities.
- You may be asked to make a presentation based on homework or class activities (alone or in collaboration with others).
- <u>Missing lectures will adversely affect your grade. I will teach concepts in class that are not</u> available in any one textbook. You will be required to use these concepts to solve questions on exams.
