AP/EN 4120 6.0A (Y)	Studies in 18th-Century Literature: The Rise of the Novel

Description:	This course traces the development of the novel across the long eighteenth century, paying close attention to how the genre engages some of the period’s key political concerns: orientalism, colonialism, and slavery; the politics of domesticity; heteropatriarchy and the colonial gender binary; discourses of property and personhood; and the development of global and racial capitalism, among others. As we’ll see, the eighteenth-century novel persists in bringing together modes that might often be thought as distinct, including romance and realism; selfhood and objectification; sensibility and commodification. Our class will closely analyze the ways in which writers revise, establish, and experiment with the novel form to offer a complicated set of social claims, and novels will be read alongside contemporary philosophy and art, as well as more recent criticism and theory. Throughout we’ll attend to the ways in which the novel reinforces and develops some of the most harmful Enlightenment discourses that remain with us today, while also seeking to recover the foreclosed possibilities that the period and its most capacious genre have to offer.
