COURSE DESCRIPTION

Studies the microeconomic aspects of international trade, tracing its historical development from the theory of comparative costs to the theory of customs unions and tariffs. Topics include trade patterns, gains from trade, trade barriers and free trade versus protectionism (the politics of Trump), supply chains and climate change, economic growth and development in the international economy, and international institutions. As well, we will examine the determinants of exchange rates and the relative merits of flexible and fixed exchange rates.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Two tests. All students must write the final exam, which will be held during the April exam period (April 8-25). This exam will be 120 minutes in length. The final will count for 60% of the total grade for this course.

As well, all students must write one of the two term tests. These tests will both be 80 minutes in length and will count for 40% of the total grade.

All three tests will require you to answer three of six questions. All the tests will be closed book – no phones, no laptops, no written notes, not textbook.

MISSED TESTS
