Extended Course Description

This course is an introduction to Monetary Economics. We first build a theoretical framework that makes sense of the presence of fiat currency, i.e., money. Through the lens of this framework we study various economic institutions and tradeoffs related to money. A deeper understanding of such institutions (e.g., central and retail banks) and tradeoffs (e.g., holding money vs capital) are important additions to a macroeconomist's toolkit. In addition, methodological tools acquired in this course are extremely helpful for other economics classes.

Evaluation

There will be a midterm and a final exam. The midterm will be held on **February 24**. The final exam will cover all material discussed in class. The date of the final exam will be determined by the Registrar's Office.

Let your scores on the midterm and final exam be m and f respectively. Your grade will be based on the following formula:

$$0.7 f + 0.3 \max \{ m, f \}$$

In other words, your midterm exam will only count if you do better in the midterm exam than in the final exam. In this case it will count for 30% of your final grade and the final exam will count for 70% of your final grade. Otherwise, your final exam will count for 100% of your final grade.

You will receive 5% bonus marks if you attend 5 classes and another 5% bonus marks if you attend 9 classes.
