Introduces students to international monetary economics. Topics include the exchange rate and exchange rate regimes, the automatic adjustment process, open economy macroeconomics and policy, international financial markets, and economic integration.

### **ACTIVE LEARNING ACTIVITIES (ALA) via eClass**

A set of problem solving and short answer questions, which will be referred to as ALA, will be posted in eClass as active learning activities (ALA) in this course. The students are expected to work on the problem sets and <u>submit the completed works as a single PDF file</u> in eClass by the due dates. There will be **5 active learning activities (ALA)** in this course. Each ALA is worth **1 mark**. If a student completes the works of an ALA and submit it in eClass by the due date, he or she will get 1 mark. On the other hand, if a student does not submit an ALA, he or she will get zero. The instructor will only count the marks of the best **5 ALAs out of 6 ALAs**. <u>Please note that an ALA will be graded solely based on the completeness of the answers, not based on the correctness of the answers.</u>
