Description:	This course aims to develop in the student the ability to read poetry with discernment and pleasure. Students will encounter a broad range of poetry from different time periods categorized according to thematic similarities. Consequently, the aim of the course is not to provide a systematic historical survey of poetry in English, but rather to examine the ways in which poetry encounters and reflects the world in which we live. In particular, we will focus on poetry as a social discourse, not as the personal scribblings of lone, tortured, underfed prophets. We will be working through a number of questions in the course - What makes poetry <i>poetry</i> ? How does a poem's form shape the way we understand the poem's content? Why is it that poetry (in spite of seeming so out of touch in many people's minds) has been and remains such an important mode of expression? The course focuses on a wide range of poetic genres and forms from various times and cultures.
