Course Overview

This course examines how individuals and organizations understand and manage careers. We will explore key metaphors and theories of career, spanning personal, organizational, and societal perspectives. Topics include self-management, boundaryless careers, social networks, narratives, and the emotional and moral tensions of work. Through readings, presentations, and applied discussions, students will develop tools to reflect on their own career paths and analyze careers in organizational settings.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- Identify and compare key metaphors and models of careers.
- Apply career theories to analyze individual and organizational career trajectories.
- Evaluate how social, cultural, and structural factors shape career experiences.
- Reflect on your own career management practices in relation to theory.
- Engage critically and collaboratively in discussions about contemporary careers.

Assessments & Grading

- Attendance & Participation (40%)
- You are required to attend 10 out of 12 classes throughout the term
- Each of these 10 classes are worth 4% of your overall grade (2% attendance, 2% participation)
- Participation means arriving on time and engaging meaningfully with lectures, class discussions, and classmates' comments (asking and responding to questions, offering thoughtful comments, building on others' ideas).
- Group Presentations (30%) (More details will be added)
 - o What: (i) Present a contemporary academic book on work/careers (from the approved list), then (ii) apply 2–3 theories and concepts (from lectures and or the book) to analyze one person's career. This could be a person one of you knows personally or a public figure/celebrity.
 - o Timing: 35 min total (+ 5 min Q&A).
 - Deliverables: Slides (PDF) due 24h before; 1-page handout with key ideas + 2 discussion questions + 5 quiz questions.
- Final Exam (30%)
- Covers lectures, readings, and presentations; emphasizes application.

Major Assessments & Final Exam (policy limits)

- For Final Exam and Group Presentation: Use Deferred Standing (University process) with documentation; do not use self-report. See Deferred Standing info and form. myacademicrecord.students.yorku.caRegistrar's Office
- Group presentation attendance note: Coordinate with your team and plan in advance not to miss the session of your group presentation. If you miss this session you will lose the mark of the presentation (30% of final mark). Because group presentation is >20%, in case of absence, self-report alone is not sufficient even if you're within your two permitted sessions. Use the form above in extenuating circumstances (documentation required).

Policy on Lateness. Being on time is part of participation. Arriving more than 15 minutes late = no participation credit for that class. Arriving late (under 15 minutes) more than 3 times = counts as 1 absence toward your participation grade.
