Course Description:

The study of money and banking includes the study of the role and function of monetary aggregates in the economy, and the study of financial markets. This course will employ economic principles to organize and analyze the structure of financial markets. This course will also study the role of the central bank, which includes its use of monetary policy to control growth and fluctuations in the Canadian economy through the chartered banking system. Furthermore, given the high degree of global financial market integration, we will also investigate the links between Canada's financial system and the international financial system.

Evaluation:

Let M = your mark from the mid-term exam and F = your mark from the final exam. Your grade will be determined by the following formula: Total mark = Max (0.4 M + 0.6 F, F).

- There will be no make-up mid-term exam. Students absent from the mid-term exam will have the weight transferred to their final exam.
- The final exam will cover all material discussed in this course. The date of exam will be scheduled by the Registrar's Office.
